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
Fun Fact

Going Down The Rabbit Hole By Thomas Gaetano

Michael Crichton

Going down the rabbit hole, I learned about Michael Crichton's personal fight with cancer. The acclaimed writer of many classic science fiction and mystery novels fought a brave battle against lymphoma, which he unfortunately lost in November of 2008. Crichton and his loved ones were confident during his treatment, even when his condition worsened. After his passing, three stories have been published with only the first being a completed manuscript (Pirate Latitudes; 2009, Micro; 2011, and Dragon Teeth; 2017). These stories were stored as electronic files and discovered by a personal assistant. I think about how fervently and passionately he may have worked after his diagnosis, and it is comforting to know that he doubled down on his passion. He was 66 when he passed, and publishers are committed to preserving the original artistic integrity of the posthumous releases by featuring the names of authors hired to complete Mr. Crichton's work. This, as opposed to uncredited "ghost writers" under the Michael Crichton brand.

JK Rowling, famous author of the Harry Potter series, apparently was rejected by 12 publishers after she completed the first manuscript while being supported by British welfare programs. She even was rejected for a detective story under a pseudonym that is completely unrelated to the fantasy series she is known for. Similarly, Stephen King struggled to get his first novel, Carrie, published, and was rejected 30 times. Even though the author gave up, his wife continued encouraging the horror master until he finally found success. He struggled to understand the mind of a teenage girl, but with the help of his wife, Tabby, the novel was published and launched his massive career.
